Art

We will be learning about National Hispanic Heritage Month goes from September 15 till October 15th, in October. We will learn about Hispanic artist. We will be creating project based on the Hispanic culture in 3-5th grade. In K-2 we will be making monsters tying in character, setting and becoming an author and illustrator,

Music

Although National Hispanic Heritage Month goes from September 15 till October 15th, we will be celebrating Spanish Heritage month exploring the instruments used in the Hispanic culture, listening to some famous Hispanic songs, and learn a little history about the artistes who wrote the music.

PE

Media

October is filled with tons of fun in the media center. In addition to identifying basic characteristics of literary and media genres (e.g., folktales, fables, poetry), we will have the book fair from 10/7-10/11. Media Literacy week is also at the end of the month.

STEM

Kindergarten will continue practicing logging into their computers and developing keyboarding skills using Typing Club.

First graders will also practice typing skills and create a paper laptop to help them recognize and understand the hardware on a laptop.

2nd graders will practice keyboarding skills and create Q-tip skeletons based on math addition skills.

3rd and 4th graders are learning how to troubleshoot hardware and software issues with computers and practicing keyboarding skills.

5th graders are working on PENDA to engage in science learning activities.



















VPK

Last month in VPK, students enjoyed learning about families and friends. We identified similarities and differences in homes and families, and role played and discussed appropriate ways to show feelings. We continued to build our finger muscles through fine motor activities. In Math, we learned how to sort objects by their attributes, how to create and duplicate an AB pattern, and explored the concept of more/less/same/equal in groups of objects. We began to segment sentences that have words and understand the difference between a sentence and a question. We developed our emergent literacy skills by identifying and describing the roles of an author/illustrator, parts of a book, sequencing story events and describing our favorite part of a story. In phonological awareness, we introduced the letter M and In Science, we experimented and predicted outcomes when mixing colors (blue/yellow to make green). Lastly, we continued to develop friendships and learned that we have both a home family and a school family and we must always take care of each other. Learning is always fun in VPK!

Kindergarten

By now, our Kindergarten students are doing a great job of sticking to their routines and knowing where they are supposed to be and what they are supposed to being doing at school. We are still practicing writing our names, identifying letters, numbers, and sounds, but we are also working on when to use an uppercase or "big" letter. Parents are encouraged to read with their students for 15-20 minutes per night and talk about the book with their children. Some things that we have learned and that your child should be familiar with are what an author does, what an illustrator does, and what the setting is in a book. In math, Kinder is working hard to display numbers in different ways, for example: dice, number lines, numeral, pictures, and words. Providing your student with manipulatives at home (rice, dice, blocks, Legos, chips, etc.) to count and use is a great way to enhance their love of math. At this age, it is a natural and fun way for them to learn. Please continue to communicate with your student's teachers about anything and everything because we are here to help. If we cannot help you directly, we can at the very least direct you to a person who can. Looking forward to a great year! Yay Kinder!

1st grade

In first grade, we are diving into two new programs. One is UFLI and the other is a new science curriculum. We are learning the letter sounds and short vowel words. In reading, we have begun unit 1 in our Benchmark Advance. In this unit, we have been studying the life cycle of a frog and discussed other life cycles such as the butterfly. We look forward to learning about other life cycles when we visit the 4H farm in October. We read poems and stories that are informational text. In writing, we have been using the Three Step Writing Strategy (I think - I speak - I write) to tell about frogs and other topics we are learning about in Benchmark Advance. In math, we have been learning strategies for finding the sum and difference in addition and subtraction problems. Keep an eye out for upcoming information about our farm field trip.

2nd grade

Second grade is excited to be working on characters and literary elements in reading such as characters, setting and plot. They are excited to identify the beginning, middle and end of stories, as well as understanding that the character, setting and problem are introduced at the beginning, events are in the middle and are working on identifying the solution at the end of the story. In addition, students are learning about the different challenges characters are facing in our stories. Have them tell you the information when they do their nightly reading. Please continue to study sight words and weekly phonics patterns every night. In math students are working hard on adding and subtracting to 100. Please make sure to look over and discuss math homework nightly to clarify any errors, misunderstandings, proper techniques, etc. At the end of October, students will be participating in our annual "math or treat" where they are able to use their math knowledge to solve problems and earn treats. More information will be coming about the donations we will need. Last but not least, Fall iready diagnostic scores are now available. Please contact your child's teacher for more information. 3rd grade

3rd grade is excited about multiplication! One of the highlights of this year is learning multiplication and division. Please continue having your child practicing their flashcards with an adult at home every night to be prepared for their weekly Friday timed test. Having these facts memorized is crucial as we continue with our math curriculum this year. Students are also asked to read 15-20 minutes each night to increase their reading fluency. Students should be able to read at least 112 words per minute and reading at home helps achieve this goal. Thank you for being our partner and pushing your child to be the best he/she can be. Please contact your child's teacher(s) if you have any questions or concerns.

4th grade

The Fabulous 4th remains ecstatic about the great potential that this school year has and is loaded with interesting skill-based lessons, practices, some assessments along with a healthy balance of fun.

In ELA, we will be diving into the literary genre of fiction. Thus, students will be developing a deeper understanding of the characters and how they drive the stories. hey will work to understand and explain how character development contributes to the plot. Also, we will work to strengthen our word knowledge by using context clues and will work to further understand the author's use of figurative language.

In writing, we will be working on the process of writing essays, and we will write our first independently written essay.

In math, fourth grade teachers are beginning the year using several forms of engagement and strategies to continue to deepen students' knowledge about place value.

Consequently, they will work with numbers in the millions. Additionally, they are practicing Multiplication and Division basic facts and multiplying multiple digit numbers.

In Science class, our young scientists will learn and practice Science of Earth in Time and Space.

In social studies students will be sharpening their geography skills by learning about landforms, bodies of water, and locations.

5th grade

Have you ever wondered what makes weather? What causes it to snow, rain, get cold, or hot? Weather is simply the state of the atmosphere. For the next month, our scientist will learn about Earth's systems and patterns. We will start with rocks and minerals and move on to the water cycle and the different forms of precipitation. At the end students will understand the difference between climate and weather as well as how weather is predicted.

In math, our 5th graders are working with whole number and decimal operations. We will be applying our operational knowledge of working with decimals to real world money word problems as well. Ensure students are studying their multiplication and division facts at home! Its imperative students know their facts fluently (the goal is 6 seconds or less).

As well, 5th grade will be starting our first fundraiser of the year at the end of September. Our students will be selling the World's Finest Chocolate bars! All proceeds will go to offset the cost of our end-of-the-year field trip to SeaWorld.

Students will continue to work on their writing skills; however, they will be doing so in not only writing but social studies. They will begin with writing a text based expository essay to inform the reader why it is important to eat healthy foods. Next, students will be researching, writing, and presenting an essay on their assigned state in Social Studies. By doing so students can familiarize themselves and their classmates with knowledge of all of the amazing states within our country.

This month in reading, students will read selections from the same realistic fiction novel. They will synthesize information to build the understandings that realistic fiction is a genre of literature in which authors create characters who could exist in real life, flaws, and all, as well as plots that could actually happen. Some of the themes we are going to dive into this month are bravery and inquisitiveness. Our readers are building their skills not only at school, but also at home as they read 20 minutes a night and create a reading response in their reading log journals. Keep up the good work readers!
