

Media - Art - Stem

March is an exciting month in the Media Center! We will kick things off with the Book Fair, giving students the chance to explore new reads. Our collaboration with the Art and STEM departments will continue, bringing creativity and innovation into our lessons. Grades K-2 will dive into the story of Pocahontas, while grades 3-5 will continue exploring The One and Only Ivan. Across all grades, we will continue to focus on building vocabulary, understanding figurative language, and identifying the central idea in these engaging texts.

VPK

VPK just completed their unit on Transportation. We were able to compare past and present vehicles, identify traffic signs and search for important details in text. Students were able to communicate and discuss various transportation methods, describe steps to plan a trip, and classify and categorize where various vehicles can travel (land, sea, water). We reviewed finding objects using positional words, identifying objects that sink and float, and reviewing simple addition problems using transportation manipulatives. We enjoyed using our imagination and creativity to create various vehicles out of shapes as well as investigate movement using ramps to experiment with speed and distance. Lastly, students explored the laws of attraction with magnets, compared wants and needs, discussed jobs, and role-played shopping as they visited our classroom travel agency. Please continue to read with your child every night to continue to build comprehension and emergent literacy skills, as well as check Remind and your child's folder for important announcements. Kindergarten

Hello, from Kindergarten! Our students are continuing to explore and learn new and exciting things in each subject! From growing plants in science, to playing charades to learn our verbs! In writing, we are perfecting our penmanship, and we're still mastering the four key components of a good sentence: punctuation, a capital letter at the start, finger spaces between words, and making sure our sentences make sense. We're practicing our writing daily and working hard to take our time and write as neatly as possible. In reading, we are brushing up on phonics, studying our sight words, and starting to determine reflective meaning from a text. Please continue to read with your child for 15-20 minutes at night, or really whenever you can! Ask them about the book after. Who were the characters? Who was your favorite character? What was the main idea of the story? Was there a problem that needed to be solved? What was the setting of the book? Go over the author and the Illustrator, and their roles in creating the book. In math, we're still practicing addition and subtraction. Manipulatives are a great tool for this age to practice math (counters, blocks, building cubes, small teddy bears, dice, etc.). We are also working on skip counting in math (counting by 2's, 5's, and 10's). In science and social studies, we're learning about monumental events and people in history, such as, Martin Luther King Jr., Rosa Parks, George Washington, and Abraham Lincoln. We are having a great deal of fun learning in Kindergarten!







1st grade

We have completed our iReady diagnostics tests. Congratulations to the students who made 50% growth in either math or reading! They are invited to join the upcoming iReady carnival as a reward for their hard work. In reading, we are focusing on identifying topics and relevant details in a text, using text features to better understand what we read, and comparing visuals and text to find similarities and differences. In math, we will be learning about time and money, exploring how to read clocks and identify coins and their values. In social studies, we have been learning about Black History and reading about important people who made significant changes in history. In writing, we will continue to work on creating expository texts and opinion pieces, where students will learn to express their ideas clearly and support them with reasons. As always, please continue to practice sight words, read with your child, and work on math for homework. Thank you for your continued involvement and support in your child's education!

2nd grade

Second grade is "Marching" to success with many academic and social skills in class. Reading will focus mainly on text features and central/main idea this month. Many text features such as illustrations/photographs, diagrams, captions, headings, maps, etc help add additional information about the topic of the story. We continue to focus on weekly phonics and grammar skills such as building on root words, perfect past tense verbs, similes and more. In writing students will continue exploring and creating their own narrative stories, editing and revising them as needed along the way. In math students will continue to explore concepts of adding and subtracting within 1,000. Our students will also be participating in a grade level field day this month. All classes will enjoy relays, hula hoop activities, tug of war games and more. Please send your child with water, comfortable clothing and tennis shoes that day! Again, thank you for all of your continued support!

3rd grade

Third grade is not taking their foot off the gas pedal! We are full speed ahead with preparing for the last FAST state tests in both reading and math! We are reviewing reading benchmarks previously taught and BEST standards in math. In reading, the students are focusing on marking nonfiction texts - looking back into the text, rereading, finding evidence to prove their answers and underlining where they found the answers. Please be sure that your child is reading every night and preparing for their weekly spelling tests. In math, we will be working with data - collecting, representing, and interpreting it. We are also reviewing previously taught math skills. And, as always, having their multiplication facts is still critical. Please quiz your child at home each night with the provided flashcards and/or have him/her do the Nearpod on the facts they are currently trying to memorize. Knowing these basic facts will save them time and frustration when completing math problems. Over break, please have your child go on iReady for both math and reading at least four days each. Thank you for your support!

4th grade

In March, our 4th graders will explore the transcontinental railroad's history, the role of immigrant communities, and the impact of U.S. expansion on Native Americans. In reading, they'll learn about communities and how various factors have shaped the United States. In math, students will deepen their understanding of fractions and decimals, solving real-world problems and using visual models. Key skills include comparing, adding, and subtracting fractions and decimals. In science, they'll measure and compare objects based on physical properties, explore the law of conservation of matter, and investigate changes in materials. In all subject areas, 4th graders are in Crunch Time, reviewing all previously taught standards for the upcoming state tests. Remember, March 31 is the BEST Writing assessment. Ensure your child is well rested and prepared. We look forward to an exciting month of learning and discovery!

5th Grade

In 5th grade math, students have started their Geometry unit. Students will be exploring the attributes of both 2D and 3D shape in order to compare and contrast them. They will also be learning about the concept of volume and the multiple ways in which you can calculate it when measuring rectangular prisms. 5th grade scientists are working hard to understanding energy. This month, students are learning how energy and electricity go hand in hand. We will explore this concept by creating circuit and testing insulators and conductor. In reading, students will read works of fiction and nonfiction related to water. They will synthesize information to build the enduring understandings that water is an essential resource that supports all life on Earth and water plays an important role in the formation of communities and societies, and in people's everyday lives. We are in "crunch" mode as we reteach and practice skills and standards to prepare for the FAST test at the end of the year. Our readers are ready to rock! Finally, we are excited about our end of the year field trip to Sea World on **May 23rd**! Information went home with your child last month and it was emailed out as well.

March 2025 Positive Behavior Interventions Supports (PBIS)!!!


