All 6th Graders must complete the LPA Summer Reading Program. This program consists of reading and analyzing one required novel.

Required Novels:

Formative Assessment (*Quiz Grade*):

After reading Where the Red Fern Grows, you must complete the Plot Curve Organizer to show your analysis of the text. This Plot Curve Organizer will be counted as a formative (**quiz**) grade for the first quarter. You will also be given a test on the novel, Where the Red Fern Grows, that will also count as a formative (quiz) grade.






Due Dates/Deadlines:

Plot Curve Organizer is due to your Language Arts teacher on **Thursday, August 24th** (A/Orange Day) and **Friday, August 25th** (B/Black Day). ***Plot Curve Organizers submitted after the due date may receive up to 50% off.***

The deadline to receive any credit on the summer reading assignments is **Wednesday, September 6th** (A/Orange Day) and **Thursday, September 7th** (B/Black Day). ***Plot Curves received after the deadline will receive 0%, so please turn in you work before the deadline!***

Theme	Central ideas in the novel; the author's meaning for the story	
Exposition	The beginning of the story, including the characters and setting.	
Conflict	The problem that makes the story interesting	
Rising Action	The events that build suspense and increase interest in a story	
Climax	The point of greatest suspense and intensity; usually near the end of the story	
Falling Action	The events that wrap up the story	
Resolution	How the story ends and the problem is solved
