New friends are finding out what the other person thinks and feels. So many of my children now will play with groups of children—we don't see the isolation of children not knowing how to participate with other kids, and I never seem to hear: 'She/he won't play with me.' It's amazing because I seldom deal with conflict anymore."

I'm enjoying getting to know all the students! I'm excited about the great things here at Rivers Edge!


Music with Mrs. Girling

Fall. They will do this through books, educational videos, stories, craft activities, and nature's objects. We will also discuss the food groups and how some foods are more healthy than others. Numbers will be all around us again, as we search and investigate for the numbers 11-15. Students will identify them and count various objects roaming around the room. Using straws the students can put them in their right place value. Please continue to read the books sent home and sign the Read and Respond all the way down. The Kindergarten Teachers appreciate all your help at home.



As we reach the end of the first quarter, first graders are settling into the routines and procedures that make them

our fabulous Rivers Edge Otters. They are practicing all the skills that make them responsible, respectful, rolemodels. SFA is a huge part of being a first grader, so it is always important to complete the read and respond homework every school night. Please take the time to praise your child as they show off their new or enhanced reading skills.



★★★ Second grade is continuously working on ₹ 2nd ₹ place value, adding and subtracting, and using mental strategies and other strategies to help them solve problems. In

reading we have been working on Literature and Informational texts, comparing and contrasting, story structure, and asking and answering questions. Reading should be done every night at home for at least 20 minutes. As your child is reading, please ask them questions to help build comprehension.



Third grade has had a busy month of learning. Currently we are working on our science unit, and we are learning all about scientists and engineers. We even completed a science experiment that let us observe which types of

soap sink and float! We will continue our study of science in our next unit, as we start learning about matter! In math, we have completed our unit on addition, subtraction, and rounding, and we have officially entered our study of Multiplication and Division! Third grade is learning so many different ways to represent multiplication problems. Please continue to have your student read at home for 20 minutes each night as well as practice multiplication facts!



4th grade is getting practice in math balancing equations. In science we are 4th exploring properties of matter includ-GRADE ing magnetism and metals that are ferromagnetic. We are excited about reading and identifying main idea and

key details across several high interest texts. We are also learning how to build community by expressing our problems with peers in a healthy manner. So many great things are happening, and we love celebrating each other in the classroom.



Greetings from Fifth Grade! Now that we are settled from Dorian, we are very busy in Fifth grade. In the beginning of October, we have

our first field trip to the St. Lucie Historical Museum to study the local Native American Tribes of the Pre-Columbian Era. We are continuing to practice planning for our essays. Planning is important, so our essays are organized and have the correct focus. We are doing a lot of science experiments in the science lab. We are still taking payments for our end of the year Sea World trip. Fifth Grade has begun our Snifty Pencil fundraiser. Look for us in the cafeteria in the mornings before school selling the scented pencils for \$1.00 each.

Gifted / High Achieving Team

Our reading wizards are enjoying the magic of reading! In 4th grade, students will be explaining events, procedures, ideas, or concepts in a historical, scientific, or technical text, including what happened and why, based on specific information in the text, as well as integrating information from two texts on the same topic in order to write or speak about the subject knowledgeably. 5th grade readers will be determining two or more main ideas of a text and explain how they are supported by key details and summarizing the text, as well as determining a theme of a story, drama, or poem from details in the text, including how characters in a story or drama respond to challenges or how the speaker in a poem reflects upon a topic and summarizing the text. In math, our 4th grade mathematicians will be able to solve problems involving volume. The lessons in this unit cover ALL 5th grade standards relating to volume. That means we will still be multiplying. Keep working on fluency. 5th graders will be able to apply understandings of arithmetic to algebraic expressions. Think: exponents, equivalent expressions, and order of operations (GEMS). Our 3rd grade group has been working very hard finding Main Idea and Details. We have been using thinking maps to organize our ideas and thoughts. In math we just finished adding and subtracting numbers up to 1000 and rounding off numbers to the nearest 10 and 100. These next couple of weeks we will be focusing on equal groups and multiplication.



VPK kids will be learning about families this month. We'll be reading stories based on traditional songs and learning to describe and classify objects by their attributes. Parents please check your son/daughters backpacks everyday. Sign the manila folder and send it back. If your child eats lunch here please check with cafeteria for account balance. If you want your child to have ice-cream on special days, they need money in their accounts.
