

Career Academies

Culinary Arts, Early Childhood Education, Criminal Justice, Game and Simulation, Digital Design, Health Science, Outboard Marine & Aerospace Technologies



Academy of Culinary Arts

What is it?

St. Lucie West Centennial is the only Premier ProStart ranked school in SLC. Throughout the Culinary Arts Academy students will learn about food safety, sanitation, working in the kitchen, fire safety, baking and pastry, recipes and measurements, seasoning and flavorings, sensory perception, soups, sauces, stocks, cost control, use of commercial tools and equipment. Students will also learn knife skills, food handling techniques, the history of food service, front of house operations and much more.

• What Certification can I earn?

 Students can obtain up to 3 certifications: SAFE STAFF, NRFSP, and Serv Safe Managers Certificate.

• What can I do with my Certification?

These certifications can be used when applying for jobs within the food service industry. Students obtaining the Serv Safe Managers Certification will be able to enter the field at the management level.

Academy of Early Childhood Education

What is it:

■ The Early Childhood Education Program aims to prepare our students to enter the workforce as a daycare and/or preschool teacher. Throughout the program students will learn about the development of children ages 0 − 12, complete your DCF required trainings, work with children at our onsite preschool, become CPR and First Aid certified and create your professional portfolio.

• What Certification can I earn?

- Students who complete this academy will be eligible to obtain their CDA (Child Development Associates Certification)
- Students will also complete their 40-hour mandatory DCF trainings

• What can I do with my Certification?

- Students obtaining their 40-hour training will be eligible to work in a preschool, right out of high school
- Students obtaining their CDA will be eligible to teach their own class at a preschool.





Academy of Criminal Justice

What is it?

 The Academy of Criminal Justice aims to give students real-life experiences with the criminal justice system. The academy provides students with a chance to observe and practice what people in the criminal justice field do every day. The different levels of the program will allow students to learn about goals and values of the criminal justice system, the pretrial and trial processes, the history of police, patrol procedures, crime prevention, constitutional law as it relates to police practices, including search and seizure, Miranda warnings, and guidelines for use of force, criminal investigations, forensics, and evidencehandling. Students will learn the basics of fingerprint evidence, blood spatter analysis, ballistics, and DNA fingerprinting

What certification can I earn?


- ALP (Accredited Legal Professionals) certification
- Students who <u>complete</u> the Criminal Justice Academy at SLWCHS (CJ1, CJ2, and CJ3) will earn 9 college credits

When can I do with my certification?

• The ALP will open doors for employment in the legal industry.

Academy of Game and Simulation

- What is it?
 - The aim of the Academy of Game and Simulation is to give students a first experience with game and simulation conceptualization, design, storyboarding, 2D/3D animation design and implantation issues. Students will learn specialized skills involving graphic animation software.
- What certification can I earn?
 - Information Technology Specialist (Device Configuration and Management)
 - Information Technology Specialist (Python Programming)
- What can I do with my certification?
 - Students will be able to obtain an entrylevel position in IT, Cyber Security, Network Systems, or other technology positions.



Academy of Digital Design

- What is it?
 - Digital Design aims to prepare students for careers in the field of digital design. Student will learn entry-level skills including computer skills, digital publishing concepts and operations, layout, design, measurement activities, and digital imaging.
- What certification can I earn?
 - Adobe Photoshop
 - InDesign
 - Illustrator
- What can I do with my certification?
 - Students can obtain an entry-level position in Web Design, Graphic Art, Video Editing, Production, and more.





Academy of Health Science

- What is it?
 - The Medical Academy is a fun and interactive program to get you on the path to a career in the healthcare industry or just explore what you might be interested in
- What certification can I earn?
 - CMAA (Certified Medical Administrative Assistant) – class 3, year 2
 - CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant) class 4, year 3
 - CET (Certified Electrocardiograph Technician) – class 5, year 3
 - PCT (Patient Care Technician) once CNA and CET certified, year 3
 - CCMA (Certified Clinical Medical Assistant) - once CNA and CET certified, year 3
- What can I do with my certification?
 - Once obtaining these certification our students will leave high school prepared to begin working in the medical field


Academy of Outboard Marine Technologies

- What is it?
 - This program offers a sequence of instruction which will prepare students with the necessary skills for entry level positions within the marine field. The course content is a rigorous combination of Electrical and Mechanical skills which fall under the Florida Department of Education performance standards for the marine industry. Students will be introduced to the fundamentals of Outboard engines, 2 and 4 stroke, Inboard Gasoline engines and drive systems as well as a variety of other Marine systems.

 - The AICE program is an international program where students earn college credit through an advanced academic curriculum. The AICE course of study aims to provide a broad and international curriculum, equip students to cope successfully with the demands of higher education, increase appreciation of world cultures, and create positive learning experiences for students.
- What are the benefits?
 - Students can earn College Credits when final exams are passed.
 - The courses are weighted and can increase GPA.
 - Students who earn an AICE Diploma can qualify for the highest level of the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship. (100% tuition paid to Florida Colleges and Universities)
