# Men's Mental Health Awareness

Men's mental health awareness is an important movement that aims to break the stigma surrounding emotional struggles and encourage men to seek help when they need it. Many men face pressure to appear strong and self-reliant, which can make it difficult to talk about feelings or mental health challenges. Rasing awareness helps promote open conversations, early intervention, and access to support systems. By normalizing mental health care for men, society can help reduce rates of depression, anxiety, and suicide, while fostering healthier relationships and communities.

# **Statistics about men's mental health:**

-Nearly 1 in 10 men report daily feelings of anxiety or depression, though less than half of that report talking to a professional or using medication.

-In the past year as of 2024, the highest rate of any mental illness was the 26-29-year age group at 32%, 10% having serious mental illness

Reading can be a journey, but for some students, it may present challenges and obstacles. Fortunately, there are several ways you can support your child at home to help make reading a fun and enjoyable experience. Consider the following tips:

- 1. Read every day, even if it's just for a few minutes. Over time, this can gradually increase to longer reading sessions.
- 2. Offer choices in reading materials. Let your child select what they'd like to read. It's important to remember that reading should be a pleasurable experience.
- 3. Read together and engage with the story. Ask questions, make comments, and discuss what's happening in the book to deepen understanding and connection.
- 4. Listen to audiobooks. These can provide comfort and reduce the stress of decoding text, especially for struggling readers.
- 5. Celebrate reading successes often. This could include finishing a book, making predictions, or answering questions about the story correctly.



# Kindergarten

# First Grade





West Gate first graders are off to a wonderful start to the second quarter! In reading, we are diving into Unit 3: "Being a Good Community Member" and Unit 4: "Learning How Stories Have Narrators." Through these units, students are discovering what it means to contribute positively to their community and how stories come to life through different voices and perspectives.

We are especially excited about a new opportunity for our students to read aloud to staff members across our campus. This experience will help build confidence, improve reading fluency, and foster a lifelong love for reading. It's heartwarming to watch their enthusiasm and pride shine as they share their growing skills!

In UFLI, our students are focusing on -ng and -nk endings, digraph review, and the long a sound. Please continue working on high-frequency and heart words daily! By memorizing these words, your child will boost both their reading fluency and comprehension.

In Math, students are learning about place value and extending the counting sequence. These foundational skills help strengthen number sense and prepare students for more complex math concepts. I-Ready is a wonderful tool to use at home for extra practice and review of standards being taught at your child's level. Our weekly goal is to complete 45 minutes in both reading and math!

In Social Studies, we are excited to begin learning about our patriotic symbols and what they represent. This unit helps students develop a sense of pride and understanding about our country and its history.

# **Third Grade**



Third grade students are growing quickly into confident, independent learners! Each student is working hard demonstrating responsibility.

We're excited to share that our third graders have just wrapped up Unit 2 in Reading, which focused on fiction reading and storytelling skills. The students explored characters, settings, and plot development with great enthusiasm! We are now beginning Unit 3, which shifts our focus to nonfiction texts aligned with third-grade standards. This unit will help students build skills in identifying central ideas, using text features, and understanding informational content. As part of our reading journey, we hope everyone is enjoying The Wild Robot! We're looking forward to having meaningful conversations with students about the book and seeing how it connects to our learning. In math, we are finishing up our place value unit. Next, we are moving onto adding and subtracting multi-digit whole numbers within 1,000. We will also focus on rounding and estimation with these numbers. We keep circling back to multiplication fluency as well.

## Math Update - Growing Minds at Work!

Our students are expanding their math skills every day! They've mastered division and are now diving into operations with whole numbers and exploring patterns. As we move forward, we'll continue reinforcing multiplication facts to ensure they are fully memorized—this foundation is key to future success in math. Keep practicing at home and celebrating their progress!

## Reading Update – Building Strong Readers!

Our students are growing as readers every day! They are developing key comprehension strategies, exploring text structures, and learning to identify main ideas and supporting details. We're also working on fluency and vocabulary to strengthen their understanding and confidence. Encourage nightly reading at home to help reinforce these skills and foster a lifelong love of reading!

# Fifth Grade





Argumentative essay writing here we come! Students will have opportunities to participate in different kinds of debates. They will be asked to choose a side and give reasons for why they have chosen that side. Teachers will be focusing on the evidence students are finding in the documents given to them, to make sure they are choosing critical information to back up their position. DBQs will begin too, these are disciplined based questions that students will have to answer and argue with evidence to prove their side

Science: Students will work identify the organs in the human body and describe their functions. Students will compare and contrast the functions of animal structures and the functions of plant structures.

AMP: For the first part of November, student will work to understand evaluating numerical and algebraic expressions and writing algebraic expressions in equivalent forms. Then, students learn that a problem situation can often be represented by an equation or an inequality that includes a variable. The equation or inequality can then be solved to find a solution to the problem situation.

In math, we are working on multiplication of whole numbers and decimals. We will also start division of whole numbers and decimals. Please continue to be sure your child is studying their facts at home for fluency.

In Reading we are wrapping up unit 2 this week which was Realistic Fiction. We will begin unit 3 which is nonfiction on The Constitution. We will be working on finding and using text evidence.

# Sixth Grade





The 6th grade ELA students have successfully completed their first unit assessment! We will continue to follow the Florida B.E.S.T. Standards for instruction, incorporating differentiated learning strategies daily to meet the diverse needs of all learners.

In World History, students are analyzing the relationship of the physical geography to the development of Egypt. They are examining how the flooding of the Nile River directly affected the people of ancient Egypt. Students are also learning about the contributions of key figures from the three eras of the ancient Egyptian Kingdoms from monumental architecture to the advancement of writing, record keeping, and art.

Math this month is filled with lessons designed to strengthen students' critical thinking, problem-solving abilities, and overall confidence in mathematics.

We will begin the month by continuing Topic 3: Simplifying Algebraic Expressions, where students learn how to combine like terms and apply the distributive property to simplify expressions. This foundational skill sets the stage for more advanced algebraic thinking.

Starting in the second week of November, we will transition into Topic 4: Solving Equations and Inequalities. In this unit, students will explore how to solve one-step and multi-step equations and inequalities and apply these skills to real-world scenarios.

Our 6th grade scientists have been diving into the fascinating world of weather and climate! From exploring how clouds form to understanding the difference between daily weather and long-term climate patterns, students are building a strong foundation in Earth science.

Reminder: The next District Science Assessment is scheduled for Thursday, November 6th. Please encourage your child to review their notes, complete any study guides, and get plenty of rest the night before. We're excited to see all their hard work shine!

## Dear Families,

As we move into November, here's a look at what your student will be learning across core subjects. We're excited to continue building skills and exploring new concepts.

### **Advanced Math:**

Students are beginning Topic 4, which focuses on analyzing proportional relationships. Key concepts include:

- Equivalent ratios
- Constant of proportionality
- Customary units
- Graphing proportional relationships

At the end of this unit, students will take the District 2 Assessment, which covers Units 3 and 4.

### **On-Level Math:**

Students will wrap up Topic 3 on proportional relationships and take the District 2 Assessment, covering Topics 2 and 3.

Next, they'll begin Topic 4, which focuses on writing algebraic expressions in equivalent forms. Students will:

- Generate, simplify, expand, add, and subtract expressions
- Analyze and write equivalent expressions

#### **Civics**

We're diving into Unit 6: How Government Works. Students will explore:

- The structure, function, and processes of the U.S. federal government
- How the Constitution establishes these systems
- The levels of courts at both the state and federal levels

## **Important Note:**

There will be no unit exams in November.

Instead, students will take a Mid-Year Check in December, covering Units 1-6.

Test Window: December 10–19 (Exact date to be announced soon)



#### Science

Students are beginning Unit 5: Energy and Matter. They'll investigate:

- Forms of energy
- Energy transfer
- Conservation of matter

**Unit Test: Scheduled for December (date to be announced)** 

## **ELA (English Language Arts)**

In November, students will continue their drama unit by reading A Christmas Carol.

They'll focus on:

- How setting impacts character and plot development
- Author's purpose
- Perspective and point of view
- Theme

Unit 2 Test: Scheduled for early December (exact date to be announced)

If you have any questions or would like to check in on your student's progress, feel free to reach out. We're looking forward to a productive and engaging month ahead.



#### **ELA Information:**

We are beginning our study of The Diary of Anne Frank, with a focus on standard R.1.1—examining character development, setting, and plot. In addition, students will explore the structural elements of drama and gain a deeper understanding of what makes up a play.

In writing, we will be reviewing and practicing extended written responses using the R.A.C.E. strategy: Restate, Answer, Cite, and Explain. This approach will help students develop clear, well-supported responses to text-based questions.

### **Math Update:**

Pre-Algebra- Students move on to Solving Equations and Inequalities, then Understand Linear Relationships. There will be a Unit Test for the last two units.

Algebra- Students will be discovering solutions with 2 Linear Equations, called Systems of Linear Equations then move on to Inequalities. Be prepared for one homework assignment per week, and a Test around November 18th/19th.

Geometry- In Unit 5, we will discuss Relationships in Triangles. We know how to prove congruence, but now we deal with perpendicular bisectors and angle bisectors inside the triangle. Geometry students will discover how sides, segments, and angles of triangles are related.

#### In Science News:

We are well into Unit 3, The Solar System, and about to start exploring Unit 4, Stars and Galaxies. These units are combined given their nature. Students will have a Unit 3 & 4 test on Thursday, November 6<sup>th</sup> (with a make-up day on the Friday the 7th).

Unit 3 Big Idea: The components of our solar system have specific patterns of movement, organization, and characteristics.

Unit 4 Big Idea: Different characteristics are used to describe the universe and the relative scale of its components, including stars and galaxies.

The Unit 4 test is scheduled for 11/5/25. Make sure your student is completing all Penda assignments on time!!

### **Spanish:**

Students should be studying their Spanish vocabulary. Spanish 2 students should be working on their project.

### 8th Grade U.S. History Update:

Please make sure your student has completed all Xello lessons for career planning that were due on 10/14.

In class, we're diving into the American Revolution through project-based learning! Ask your student about:

- The greatest break-up letter of all time
- Washington crossing the Delaware
- · The role of women in the war

We're excited to see their curiosity and critical thinking shine!




# **Electives**

#### 2025-2026



We encourage students to take pride in their attire as it relates to the school setting. Students are to dress in a manner that, in addition to the following guidelines, takes into consideration the safety, health, and welfare of self and others, and does not disrupt the learning environment. **Appropriateness of dress shall be determined by the school administration** per Governing Board Policy. If there is a dress code violation, the student will be allowed to change

# Permitted Not Permitted

#### **Tops - Shirts and Blouses:**

 Must have sleeves, reach hips, & have school appropriate logos, images, and phrases.

# **Bottoms - Pants, Joggers, Jeans, Capris, Shorts, Skirts:**

- Must be worn at the waist and be fingertiplength or longer.
- Any clothing with frays or distressed material must <u>not</u> reveal skin.

#### **Dresses:**

- Must have sleeves and be loosely fitted.
- Must be fingertip-length or longer.

#### Sweaters, hoodies and Jackets:

- Must be worn with a school appropriate shirt underneath.
- Hoods must remain down while on school grounds.

#### **Shoes:**

 All footwear must be closed-toed and have a back or strap.

#### **Head Attire/Jewelry:**

 Headbands (non-distracting) must be worn on top of the head and not on the forehead.

#### **Clothing:**

- No spandex, tight fitting, see-through.
- No leggings, pajama pants, jeggings, onesies, yoga pants, biking/compression shorts.
- \*Leggings/bike shortsmay be wornonly whenundera dress/skirt orshorts of appropriate length\*
  - No clothing with alcohol, drugs or weapons references or anything profane, obscene or indicating gang or criminal association. No
  - visible undergarments. No clothing with
  - holes, rips, frays or tears that expose skin.

#### **Shoes:**

- No flip flops, house slippers or slides.
- No shoes with wheels

#### **Head Attire/Jewelry:**

- No kerchiefs, caps, hats, sunglasses, bandanas, doo-rags, sweatbands, and combs on hair or similar items are permitted.
- No spiked jewelry.
- No headphones, Air Pods, earbuds
- Shower caps

#### **Disciplinary Action/Consequences**

- Verbal warning and opportunity to correct dress code
- Parent Contact
- Conference with administration AND Lunch detention
- Saturday school/In School Suspension
- Violations may result in a modified dress code determined by administration (examples include but are not limited to the requirement of wearing belts, clear backpacks, zippered jackets, etc.)

Due to rapid changes in our society, it may become necessary to modify the dress code or to include additional items at the judgement of administration.

<sup>\*\*</sup>State Law – Each student is prohibited from, while on school grounds during the regular school day, wearing clothing that exposes underwear or body parts in an indecent or vulgar manner or in a manner that disrupts the orderly learning environment. A student who violates this dress policy will be subject to progressive disciplinary actions as outlined by the Code of Conduct.
